

LABOR SHIFTS WILL BE STUDIED

The State Conference Decides Upon a Method of Taking Care of the Supply

General support was given to a state-wide plan for keeping in touch with fluctuations of labor through-out the state at the conference of officials of the Department of Labor and Industry in conference at the Capitol late yesterday.

Acting Commissioner Walter McNichols instructed the 100 inspectors of the department to report to Harrisburg immediately wherever men are released from wartime tasks.

The reports of any releasing of men in each inspector's district will be referred at Harrisburg to the bureau of employment of the Department of Labor and Industry in order that steps may be taken to shift

2,204 NAMES ON CASUALTY LISTS ON FRENCH SOIL

London, Nov. 27.—Dr. W. S. Solf, German foreign minister, has asked the Allies once more for a mitigation of the armistice conditions and has requested permission to delay the delivery of railroad rolling stock, under the terms of the agreement between Germany and the Allies, until February 1, on the ground of difficulty.
