Shall We Feed Germany **And Stint Ourselves?**

An examination of the American press shows that the German wail for food, which was the first sign of life of a new-born German Government, has not aroused any large amount of compassion over here. To many observers this "propaganda" is important as the opening gun of Germany's fight for a victory at the peace table. All our late full-Germans, pro-Germans and pacifists are expected to come out of hiding forthwith and "show mercy to the defeated." "They will come," predicts the Kansas City Star, "bearing bouquets, asking permission to offer conso-lation to the prisoner and to leave tracts and flowers in the cell. . . . Heaven spare us now from mush." On the other hand, Mr. Herbert C. Hoover, the Food Administrator, says, "there has been a great deal of unnecessary furore in this country about feeding the Germans. We are not calling upon the American people to make any sacrifice with a view to feeding the Germans. Remove the water-tight blockade and the Germans will take care of themselves.
