

"Three of them came after the wounded lieutenant and myself, cutting his throat and kicking me and striking us both with clubs. I became unconscious. I had no ammunition and couldn't defend myself. When the stretcher bearers came back for the wounded we were told that the three who were caught attacking us had been shot by our men. Those of the women who were not shot were recaptured.

"We were informed that a battalion of German women maching gunners was in the fighting. Believe me, we prefer to fight men. Most of the Germans we met were too busy running to put up much of a fight. They were a mean lot, too. I've seen them shoot down Red Cross men who went out on the battlefield to pick up the wounded."
