Expense Account Entered at the Capitol Sets Forth Immense Campaign Work

The most complete statement of a campaign ever entered at the State Capitol was filed late yesterday afternoon by Charles Johnson, treasurer of the Republican State Committee. It summarizes the business of the campaign, the most extensive on record, showing contributions of over \$260,000 and expenditures with \$18,000 of that sum. Notes amounting to \$37,000 were paid off. The Democratic States Committee statement shows that the state machine bossed by Palmer and McCormick owes \$8,000 in notes, but many think it difficult to see for what the Democratic state organization spent so much money this year as it was unsusually quiet except when fighting its own candidate for Governor.
