ENBEAVERERS PLAN NATIONAL MISSION STUDY DRIVE

Many Interesting Events Are Promised For the Christian Endeavor Program in Pennsylvania

Christian Endeavor boosters are working a big drive of the winter in the interest of normal mission study classes. The International C. E. Mission Study Drive will begin boosting early for the important work which is to be accomplished in February and March.

Every society in North America is expected to have at least two mission study classes during these two months: one on home missions and one on foreign. Each society will use the book it finds best suited to its needs. Many will use the new Missionary Education Movement books, "Ancient Peoples," "New Peoples," and "The Gospel For a Working World," while others will use the special books put out by their own denominations.

A plan has been made for to succeed in February and March. Every society in every city and town in North America is urged to run a normal class in January, meeting twice a week, in which shall be brought together the two main Christian Endeavor and other young peoples' societies who will teach the class in their own church in February and March.
