HEARST CABLED HALE TO WRITE FAVORING PEACE

Telegram From New Yorker Read Into Senate Propaganda Record

Probe Shows Hearst Cables President pretender; Accuses Cabinet officer of manufacturing false evidence; Ordered attack on espionage bill; Planned forgerly paper for Sunday paper.

Washington, Dec. 10.—Government copies of telegrams signed by William Randolph Hearst giving instructions regarding the policy of his newspapers and their correspondents during the war were read into the record at today's hearing of the Senate committee investigating German propaganda.

In a message to the New York American on February 24, 1917, Mr. Hearst outlined instructions to be cabled to William Hayward Hale, the Hearst correspondent in Berlin and who, according to evidence recently produced was on the German payroll without Hearst's knowledge.

Professor Albert Bushnell Hart, Harvard University, pointed to his record and to his published articles on the war as evidence that his name had no place on the German "list of important names" in the country's investigation of German propaganda.

Washington, Dec. 10.—The authenticity of the note sent by Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, the German foreign secretary, to the German minister to Mexico, as published in the United States in March, 1917, was admitted in dispatches from the German capital shortly after the publication of the note in this country.
