2,898 Reported in Casualties
Overseas by the War
Department

Washington, Dec. 11.—The total number of casualties given out by the War Department to-day amount to 2,898. Of these 355 were killed in action, and 51 Pennsylvanians were among this number. The summary follows:

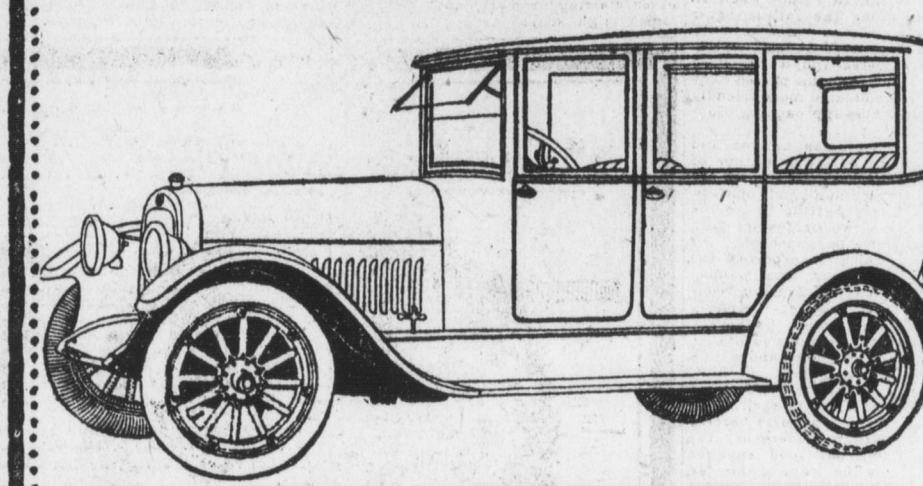

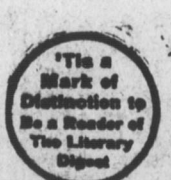
