

68 STATE BOYS FALL IN DRIVE ON HUN ARMIES

War Department Reports Casualties to the Number of 4,887

Washington, December 12.—Sixty-eight Pennsylvanians are reported killed in action in the lists of casualties given out by the War Department to-day. The total number on the lists is 4,887, 1,642 being recorded as severely wounded. The summary follows:
