## 44 Soldiers From State Are Killed in Action in France

Washington, December 12.—Four-year Pennsylvania are reported killed in action in the lists of casualties given out today by the War Department. The total number of casualties reported is 4,392. The summary follows:

## Railroads to Give Positions Back to Fighting Men

New York—It was stated authoritatively at the offices of the Eastern Regional Director of the United States Railroads here that every employee of the nation's rail systems who answered the call to the colors will be restored to his former position, with no loss in seniority or customary advancement because of his patriotic absence. The New York Central lines gave 12,000 men to the fighting and engineering forces of the nation. Computing the total number of railroad men in the service from the Central's proportion, it is shown that more than 400,000 men

now wearing khaki came from railroad offices, shops and trains. It was said there will be few places on the railroads for discharged soldiers who left other civilian capacities. A prominent railroad official said that although the railroads' business will decrease because of the decrease in shipments of war materials, the shrinkage of immigration from 800,000 annually before the war to 18,000 during its progress has created a sharp demand for mining men for all types of work. This official said: "There are twenty regiments of engineers, recruited from the railway companies, who built more than 2,000 miles of the best lines in France, running from Brest around Paris, and keeping up

with the extension of the Allied front. "These men were gathered chiefly by appeals by the government to the companies to which they were attached. The more skilled men received commissions, although many sacrificed well paying positions for a buck private's emolument. Foremen, engineers, surveyors, even experienced clerks, donned the khaki. "The women who took the places of many of the men seem ready to go back to their pre-war pursuits and make way for their masculine predecessors. Many of the men will not return to the railroads, and with the resignation of the women, places for all patriots will be assured. "The mines are paying \$5 a day on

an average. While this is work for only a sturdy type of man, the war training has fitted thousands who otherwise would not have been physically fit. "The United States Employment Service has placed many discharged soldiers in good positions. The machinery of the service, it was stated, is being groomed for the work of placing thousands who shortly will be discharged. **NEW YORK'S HIGH WAGES** New York—During September official figures show that the average weekly earnings of employes in this state was \$22.31, an increase of \$1.91 over August, and the highest of any month since 1914.
