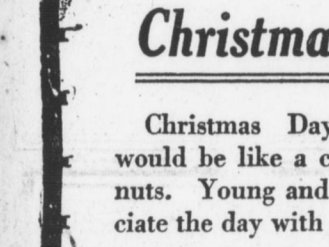

ARMY LETS OUT 15,000 TROOPS EACH 24 HOURS

Speed to Be 30,000 Daily When Demobilization Plan Is in Full Swing

Washington, Dec. 14.—Demobilization in the United States now is proceeding at the rate of 15,000 men released from the Army every day.

General March announced to-day it still is anticipated that a rate of 30,000 a day will be reached when full momentum is attained.

Must Await Turn For Home. The War Department now has designated a total of 824,000 men in the United States for discharge, an increase of nearly 200,000 during the last week.

General March made it clear, however, that designation of troops does not mean immediate discharge, but severance from the service as their turn is reached in demobilization.

Porto Ricans Ordered Loose. Among the new branches of the demobilization plan, 12,000 Porto Rican troops ordered discharged. Of 824,000 men designated, 352,000 are in depot and development battalions and similar limited units. In addition, 18,000 men on industrial furlough are being released.

Demobilization of officers is proceeding more rapidly than in the case with the men. General March said discharged since the armistice was signed.

30,703 Yanks Leave France. Summarizing the flow of returning troops from France, General March said a total of 5,653 officers and 135,262 men had been designated for return by General Pershing up to December 12. Of that number, 1,322 officers and 30,703 men actually have sailed from France.

Soon there will ring out the glad music of Barnby, Simper, Tours, Sullivan, Shelly, Buck and Gabe Simper's "Sing O' Heavens," Barnby's "King All Glorious," Shelly's "Christian, the Horn Breaks Sweetly O'er Us," will be heard in all their glorious harmonies.

There will be selections from the "Four Little Gospels," "Redemption" and others of the great oratorios.

At Reformed Salem Church to-morrow evening Bennett's "God Is a Spirit," a beautifully arranged anthem, will be sung by the splendid choir, in the morning an anthem, "The Sun Shall Be No More," "Thy Light By Day," will be the choir offering.

"Hail, Gladdening Light," one of the best of the Field Christmas anthems, will be on the choir programs of several Harrisburg churches on Christmas Day. The tenor solo in this work is especially striking.

Stult's setting of the exquisite poem, "Saviour, Whom I Pain Would Love," has been selected by Choirmaster Howard E. Gensler for use in Derry Street United Brethren Church to-morrow evening. The melodious works of Stult find particular favor in the churches of the country that are free from ritualism, and this number likely will prove to be a gem in the Derry Street Church to-morrow.
