UNDERMYER ASSERTS HE WAS LOYAL TO COUNTRY

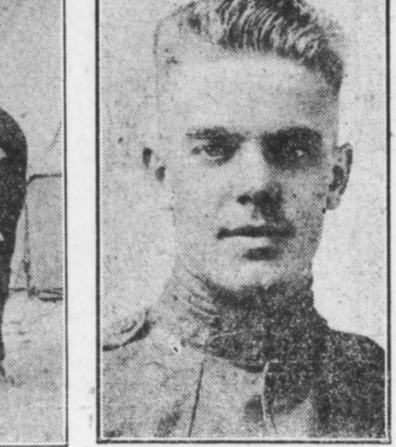

BURBESON OFFERS TO BE NATION'S OWNERSHIP OF SYSTEMS CHARACTERIZED BY POSTMASTER

General as Imperative

Washington, Dec. 17.—Ownership by the government of the telephone and telephone systems of the nation was advocated by Postmaster General Burbeson yesterday in a letter to Representative Moon, chairman of the House Committee on Post Office and Post Roads. Mr. Burbeson said the system can be acquired "without the appropriation of a dollar from the treasury" by applying to an amortization fund for twenty-five years the savings made under government ownership through elimination of expenditures in plants and operating expenses.
