

25 STATE BOYS GIVE LIVES IN WAR IN FRANCE

7,079 Are Reported in Casualties by the War Department

Washington, Dec. 18.—The number of names in the casualty lists given out by the War Department today totals 7,079. Of this total 5,839 were wounded in a greater or less degree, the greatest number of wounded being listed as "wounded severely."
