

# HARRISBURGERS NAMED IN LATE CASUALTY LIST

### Six Local Men and 263 Pennsylvanians Reported by the War Department Today

Washington, Dec. 21.—The casualty lists issued by the War Department were comparatively light today, with 2,421 names reported. Two hundred and sixty-three Pennsylvanians are included in the lists, of whom two are from Harrisburg, and four from that vicinity.

**FREE INSURANCE GIVEN EMPLOYEES**  
 [Continued from First Page.]  
 The expense to be borne by the company without any expense to those benefited. The Lalance-Grosjean Manufacturing Company was the first large industrial plant secured for Harrisburg by the original Board of Trade, and the free insurance to be inaugurated here has been tried out with success. The Woodhaven plant of the company. The protection is in addition to any compensation to which employees might be entitled under the workmen's compensation act.

**Benefits Up to \$1,000**  
 The plan insures all employees who have been in the service of the company for three months or more, and will take effect January 1, 1919. The death benefits are \$500, for more than one year in the service, \$600 and \$100 for each additional year of service to the maximum amount of \$1,000.

The announcement to the employees this morning was made by John Grey, manager of the Harrisburg branch of the company. Previous to the meeting this morning in front of the mill office, notices had been posted about the plant requesting that all employees without exception meet at the specified time, and that an important announcement would directly affect the future welfare of all employees and their families would be made. Following the posting of notices, speculation as to the nature of the announcement was rife among the men at the plant. All varieties of theories were advanced as to just what was in store for each employee, but none guessed the real surprise that was coming.

**Good Feeling**  
 In concluding the announcement, Manager Grey expressed the hope that the year 1919 would further extend the good feeling between the company and its employees. The announcement was greeted with applause from the men. Then each man who has been in the service of the Harrisburg plant for three months or more, was handed a large decorated Christmas greeting folder containing an application blank and greetings signed by J. H. Walbridge, president of the company. A resolution of thanks to the company and its president for their interest in the Harrisburg employees was drawn up and adopted by the men present.

The motion for the thanks resolution was made by Olie Wagner, a roller and one of the veterans of the Harrisburg mill, and was seconded by C. E. Landis, the cashier of the local branch of the company. At this evening's meeting of the Lalance-Grosjean's Employees' Beneficial Society, in West End hall, 1930 Wood street, the annual dividend will be paid to the members. Although this organization was hard hit by the influenza epidemic, it has not failed to return to the members a portion of the dues paid during the year.
