

13 PENNA. MEN KILLED IN WAR; 8,711 REPORTED

373 Give Lives in War With Germans in Overseas Zones

Washington, December 23.—A total of 8,711 names appear on the casualty lists given out by the War Department for the week ending Dec. 21. Total 2,385 are reported for Sunday and 6,326 for today. Of the total of 164 killed in action for the two days' reports, 13 were Pennsylvanians. The summary for the two days follows:

Wilson Opposes Sinking Vessels Surrendered by the German Government

Washington, Dec. 23.—It may be stated authoritatively that President Wilson will oppose in the most direct fashion proposals from any source to sink the warships surrendered by Germany under the terms of the armistice.

Since word came from Paris that American delegates to the peace conference, with British support, intended to advocate destruction of the enemy vessels to avoid contention over their distribution, the subject has been discussed with much interest among American and allied naval officers here.

Officials have professed to know nothing about the attitude of the President until today, when it was learned that he viewed the plan altogether undesirable.

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
