A navigable Susquehanna river is now much nearer, the result of the favorable reporting out of the bill of Congressman William Griest, of Lancaster, providing for the survey of the Susquehanna river from its mouth to this city to determine the feasibility of making the river navigable.

Under the provisions of the measure, which is an omnibus bill and has \$26,926,244 in money provided for it, the Secretary of War is "authorized and directed to cause a survey to be made of the Susquehanna river between the mouth of the said river in the state of Maryland and the city of Harrisburg on the said river, with the view of determining the feasibility of making said river navigable."
