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

Every other civilized nation, as far as I know, has a budget. Certainly every government to which we should look for any sort of good example has one. The form and character of the government have nothing to do with it. Extremely democratic Switzerland has a budget. The autocratic German Empire had a budget; Japan with its curious graft of very liquided constitutionalism on a trunk of medieval absolutism, has a budget. Nonnanly monarchical England and republican France have budgets. The form and character of the government have nothing to do with it. Every intelligent government has a budget as a matter of course—just as every intelligent businessman, whether he is an American or a Chinaman, has a set of books. Universal experience and plain common sense dictate it. Only the United States among important and advanced nations goes without a budget—to its great and undisputed loss.

There must be some organ of the government which is in intimate and constant touch with all the executive departments that spend the public's money. In England and Germany this organ is called the Treasury Department, but the name is inmaterial.
