PLAN OF THE STATE GAME COMMISSION MEETS WITH GENERAL FAVOR IN STATE

The State Game Commission will meet at its January meeting in plan to have at least \$50,000 of the proceeds of the hunters' licenses expended for the purchase of land.

COMPENSATION CHANGES ASKED Anthracite Miners First in the Field in Regard to the Next Assembly

Nine changes to the Pennsylvania state compensation act of 1915 will be asked by the anthracite miners of the state, and steps to prepare the bills for the Legislature which will meet here within a few weeks are being taken.

The amendments are announced as follows: 1. The waiting period of fourteen days now provided in the act should be eliminated and compensation begin from the date of injury.

2. The injured employ should have the right to select his own physician. 3. Payment of compensation for the loss of members of the body, such as an eye, a hand, a foot, or a leg, should be doubled in amount and length of time of payment.
