Grove, formerly county treasurer, died at her home in East Main street, on Sunday night, after an illness of several days with pneumonia. She was aged about 65 years and is survived by her husband and two brothers, Jeremiah and Uriah L. Balsbaugh, both of Hummelstown.

COMPANY D MAN WOUNDED

Marietta, Pa., Dec. 31.—Private George B. Flora, son of Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Flora, of Wrightsville, has been gassed and wounded in France, in 1918, at the age of 18 years. He told his parents he was going to work and started across the Columbia bridge. Instead, he boarded a train and went to Harrisburg, enlisting in the service in Company D, Eighth Pennsylvania Regiment. He was on the Mexican border. Returning from the border, he enlisted again and in May, 1918, sailed for France. He is six feet two inches tall. He will be discharged from the service in a few days.

CASUALTIES IN GUARD COMMAND

Many Harrisburgers Among Killed and Wounded in Co. C, 112th Regiment
Chambersburg, Pa., Dec. 31.—Company C, 112th Infantry, of Chambersburg, according to word from its officers, lost twenty-six killed, had 144 wounded and nine missing during its service. Its main battles were the fifth German offensive, Ourcq and Vesle, Meuse-Argonne and Thiaucourt. A number of members of the company, formerly of Eighth Pennsylvania National Guard, came from Harrisburg.

Meadville Jeweler Returns Home From French Front

Mechanicsburg, Pa., Dec. 31.—After varied experiences and travel through England, France, Alsace and the border of Switzerland, Roy E. Weaver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grant Weaver, of West Coover street, returned to his parents' home on Sunday morning on a short furlough. Previous to entering the United States service he was a jeweler at Meadville and received training at Camp Poole, Ga. Private Weaver is a member of the Fifty-second Infantry Machine Gun Company and although he was appointed watch inspector to adjust and regulate the watches of the officers, yet he took his place with the company and served three months in the trenches. Prior to coming home he was confined to a base hospital with influenza. Private Weaver expects soon to be mustered out of service when he will return to private life again, returning to his jewelry business at Meadville.

Bernard Schmidt Disposes of His Big Carlisle Bakery

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 31.—Bernard Schmidt has disposed of his bakery interests in Carlisle, according to an announcement made today. The Harrisburg man some months ago purchased the Mulgrew Baking Company, of Carlisle, the plant of which was destroyed by fire early in the summer. William Mulgrew, the former manager, has purchased the bakery and will at once begin the erection of a new modern building.

LEVI BRINDLE DIES

Mechanicsburg, Pa., Dec. 31.—The death of Levi Brindle occurred at his home in Monroe township early yesterday morning at the advanced age of 91 years. Mr. Brindle, who followed farming in his early years, lived in that locality practically all his life. Surviving in his wife, who was formerly Sarah Firestone; brother, William Brindle, and a sister, Mrs. Moses Markley, both of Mechanicsburg. No funeral announcement is made at this time.

INFLUENZA BAN LIFTED

Chambersburg, Pa., Dec. 31.—Chambersburg schools and most of those in Franklin county, because of the influenza and its flarebacks, have had so far this term but ten days' sessions. The local board of health has now raised the ban beginning on Thursday and children may attend schools, theaters, churches, etc.

THEATER ORDERED CLOSED

Waynesboro, Pa., Dec. 31.—Because Manager James Houser, of the Star Theater, Chambersburg, permitted children under 18 years to attend shows there, breaking the edict of the board of health, influenza ban, the health board, at a special meeting Saturday, took action, ordering the theater closed for one week. The mandate was at once put into effect.

TROLLEY STRIKES TEAM

Waynesboro, Pa., Dec. 31.—A trolley car of the Chambersburg and Greencastle Street Railway, enroute to Chambersburg, collided with a horse and wagon driven by a man by the name of Aughinbaugh, near Chambersburg. The man received a fractured shoulder blade and was taken to the Chambersburg hospital. The horse escaped injury.

Suburban Notes

Reports Show Good Work of Carlisle Commerce Chamber During Year

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 31.—An interesting record of achievement was presented last evening at the annual meeting of the Carlisle Chamber of Commerce when directors were elected and a program of work mapped out. It was shown that while the work of the chamber, as that of the majority in the United States, had been devoted to war work mainly, much of local benefit had been accomplished. There was a ten per cent gain in membership. President Lee presided and presented his report, covering the main features of the year's work. Chief of these were the securing of the new General Hospital, the securing of definite assurance that it would be kept here and the progress made in securing an insurance rearing for the town, and better transportation facilities. Several celebrations were held, and a big peace jubilee is planned. Thirteen luncheons were held with an average attendance of 110 and the speakers being nationally or internationally prominent. Industrial advancement for the coming year, civic improvement and the securing of additional accommodations for hospital visitors and a community house were among the plans discussed.

Adjustments of the courses of study have been made and many changes followed. Arrangements are being made to give credit to students in military service. Dr. M. G. Filler, dean of the institution, who has been engaged in war work for a year, resumed his duties. The fraternity houses have been reopened, a campaign for new men being expected now that War Department rules have been lifted.

MARRIED FIFTY YEARS

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 31.—The fiftieth anniversary of their wedding was quietly celebrated by Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Corman, a well-known Carlisle couple, the former being a Civil War veteran. Gifts were received from many parts of the country. The couple have been life-long residents of Carlisle and are active in church work. Mr. Corman served through the war with Company A, Two Hundred and Ninth Regiment.

\$8,000,000 FOR WAR WORK

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 31.—Cumberland county has raised over \$8,000,000 so far for war purposes, according to a statement of George E. Lloyd, chairman of the Liberty Loan and War Savings Committees. This is an average of \$155 per capita for the entire district. So far ten of the banks have subscribed for \$123,000 in short term certificates of indebtedness as against the new Liberty Loan.

GOOD CARE OF ORPHANS

Loysville, Pa., Dec. 31.—During the recent influenza epidemic, a total of 298 cases were reported at the Tresser Orphans' Home of the Lutheran Church, by Superintendent Charles W. Weidel. But of this great number of cases, only two fatalities resulted. Great credit is given the regular and volunteer nurses for the work they performed and for the aid they gave in keeping the mortality rate so low.

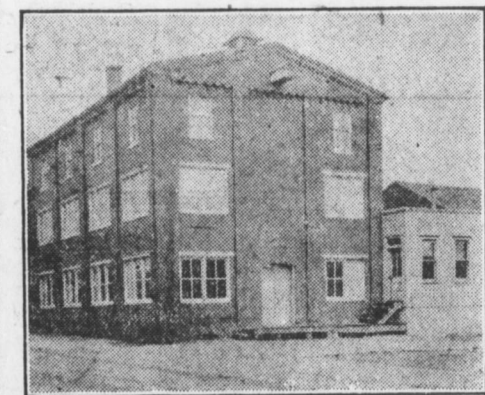
