

1,000,000 Toll in War Through Pest of Lice

London, Jan. 3.—Of the insects responsible for the death or disablement of hundreds of thousands in the war zone, the louse is declared

authoritatively to have been one of the most deadly and to have accounted for at least 1,000,000 persons.

That, however, is only a rough estimate, and the probability is that the toll was infinitely higher, for in Serbia alone typhus, a louse-borne disease, infected nearly 1,000,

000 persons and killed 500 a day in the little city of Jassy, while 200 of the 1,200 medical officers in the country died from the disease. This disease spread over Russia, Austria, Germany and the Balkans generally. These figures are vouched for in a publication prepared by Lieuten-

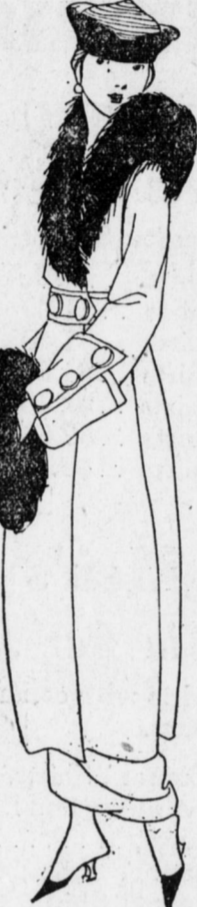
