

**MECHANICSBURG
CASE IS DECIDED**

**Millwright Fatally Injured on
Hoffer & Garman Enterprise
Is Entitled to Compensation**



"We are of the opinion that the referee made no error in awarding compensation to the claimant, though we are constrained to holding that the right of compensation began February 18, the date of the decedent's death, rather than two weeks later." This is the opinion of James W. Beach, State Compensation Commissioner, concurred in by the remainder of the board, in the appeal of Hoffer & Garman, grain dealers, of Mechanicsburg, against award of compensation to Mary J. Stretch, of Mechanicsburg, widow of J. B. Stretch, a millwright, who was fatally injured while setting up a flour mill in connection with the plant of that firm. The contention was made that Stretch was only a "casual" employe and that since the erection of the mill was not a gainful enterprise, since they were at the time making no profit from it, he was not entitled to compensation. The opinion overrules these points. With regard to the claim of J. B. Stretch for compensation previous to his death, the opinion is given that this claim must be adjusted through an administrator.

Other Cases Decided—Appeal from allowance of compensation, Emma Moorehead, Greensburg vs. Jacob Wineman Greensburg, new hearing granted.

Appeal from decision of referee, Andy Phillips, Carnegie, vs. Columbia Steel and Shafting Company, Pittsburgh, appeal dismissed and order terminating compensation affirmed.

Appeal from award of compensation, Michael and Catherine Kearns, Poland, Pa., vs. W. Harry Brown, Licia, appeal dismissed.

Petition for review, Joe Black, Josephine, vs. E. H. Brna, Hollisburg, petition dismissed.

Appeal from decision of referee, Min Halkish, Wilpen, vs. Pittsburgh & Baltimore Coal Company, appeal dismissed.

Appeal from allowance of compensation, Abram Kester, Punxsutawney vs. Punxsutawney Fair Association, appeal dismissed.

Petition for review, Chester Henry, Indiana vs. John W. Henry, Indiana, the case being wherein compensation agreement was entered into between claimant and defendant and the board setting aside the agreement insofar as it affects payment of cost of major surgical operation.

Bolshevik Aiding in latest Berlin Outbreak

Copenhagen, Jan. 7.—Adolph Joffe and M. Radek, leaders of the Bolshevik mission to Germany, are in Berlin assisting Dr. Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg in fomenting a Bolshevik revolution. According to advices received here they are believed to be the police headquarters, which is the stronghold of the Spartacists.
The Independent Socialists, whose leaders were recently dismissed from the government, are reported to have gone over entirely to the Spartacists. These two groups have issued a joint proclamation declaring that the final fight to preserve the revolution must now be fought.

Thousands March in Great Street Parade

Berlin, Monday, Jan. 6, 1 P. M.—The Spartacist group is engaged today in a big demonstration against the government. Tens of thousands of followers of Dr. Karl Liebknecht have been parading Unter den Linden and the Brandenburgerstrasse and this dispatch is filed as returning along Unter den Linden. Up to this time no shots have been fired.
The Wilhelmstrasse from Unter den Linden to below the Leipzigerstrasse is packed full of government sympathizers who have been standing there for two hours. It appears to be the government's strategy to prevent the Spartacist demonstration before the government offices.

Scum of the City
Hundreds of youths and other villains in the Spartacist ranks are carrying rifles. Fist fighting has occurred at the corner of the Wilhelmstrasse and Unter den Linden where the Bolshevik demonstrators took away their opponents' standards. Spartacist soldiers took a stand in open order in front of the Hotel Adlon with their rifles ready, but there was no firing.
The Spartacist marchers, except the workmen from certain factories, comprise the scum of the city, and five-fifths of the whole number are dragged women and young girls.
The American flag has been hoisted over the Hotel Adlon, where the American officers belonging to the prisoner-and-food commission are being held.
The opinion seems general that by a miracle can prevent bloodshed before the end of the day.
