RUNAWAY FOUND AT WASHINGTON

Claims Instructions Had Been Issued by God For Him to Run Away

New Germantown, Pa., Jan. 9.—Claiming to have asked God for instructions and that He told him what to do, Roy Alexander, 12-year-old son of Mrs. John W. Frey, of New Germantown, ran away from his home in the middle of December. Yesterday he was located at Washington by relatives who put little credence in the theory of his divine instruction, and he was brought to his home here.

Millerstown Businessman a Victim of Influenza

Millerstown, Pa., Jan. 9.—After an illness of twelve days, Morton R. Page died at his home in Greenwood street Monday night of pneumonia developing from Spanish influenza. He was 29 years old and was engaged in the shirt factory business at this place with his brother, C. C. Page. He was a member of the Knights of the Old Golden Eagle and of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He is survived by his wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Banks Page; three sisters, Mrs. Hulda Knight, Duncan, Mrs. John Satterback, Lewis, and Mrs. Harry Beacham, of this place; two brothers, Mervyn Page, of Lewistown, and C. C. Page, of this place. Funeral services will be private. They will be held from his late home Friday morning at 10 o'clock. The Rev. Victor Nearhoff, his pastor, will officiate. Burial will be in Riverview cemetery.

Columbia Planning Square as Memorial to Soldiers

Columbia, Pa., Jan. 9.—A movement has been started to purchase a number of properties at the intersection of Locust and Fifth streets and Lancaster avenue and lay out a large public square as a memorial to Columbia soldiers. A monument is to be erected in the center. The proposition is being urged by members of a committee selected from the Woman's Club and the Merchants and Business Association to prepare a memorial to the soldiers in the town. Mr. H. W. North Jr., who headed all the war campaigns in the borough, is urging the movement.

The movement was introduced by the Chamber of Commerce following demands of several years for accommodations. The new hotel will be called the Carlisle, and will have a rooming house and large dining ladies' room and dining room, the latter to be the largest in the town. It is planned to open the hotel in about four months.

FOUR DEATHS AT WAYNESBORO

Waynesboro, Pa., Jan. 9.—Abram L. Spangler, son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Spangler, died yesterday morning of double pneumonia following an attack of influenza. He was 37 years of age and is survived by his wife and eight children, the youngest of whom is two months old. Funeral services will be held on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mrs. Carrie Funk Friedley, wife of Stover Friedley, a miller, of this city, died yesterday. She was 51 years of age and is survived by her father, husband and four children.

10 Million War Marks For Yankees' Expenses

Coblenz, Monday, Jan. 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—A million dollars arrived here from Berlin to-day by special train, this sum being the first payment by the German government of the 20,000,000 marks due in January for the expenses of the American Army of occupation. The arrival of this money shipment makes a total of 61,000,000 marks which has been turned over to the American authorities for the current expenses of the occupying forces. One-day leaves for the American Army of occupation will begin on Tuesday, when 1,500 officers and men from the First, Second and Thirty-second divisions will be entertained by the army and welfare organizations of Coblenz. A plan is being worked out whereby it is expected that all the officers and men of the Third Army will be allowed a day's leave to be spent here on their way home.

Yankee Aces Called Home to Found Flying School

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 9.—Washington advices received here say that Captain Edward V. Rickenbacher, and seven other American aces, who have either reached home or are on their way, have been called home by the government to found a flying school which will rank with West Point Military Academy and Annapolis Naval Academy. Other aviators mentioned are Major William K. Thaw, Captain Sanford Biddle and Lieutenant Tolm, who are already in the United States.

INDIANS TO VISIT VALLEY

Chambersburg, Pa., Jan. 9.—Burgess J. P. Wingert, of this place, in receipt of a letter from Chief Skinnushu, of the Yakima Indian Reservation, Wapinitia, Washington, saying that the chief and his cousin, Black Hawk, will pay Chambersburg a visit about June 12. The two Indians are undertaking a trip from their reservation to Washington, D. C., with a tribal message to the government and President Wilson, asking for full citizenship for the Western American Indians. The two Redskins will make the trip on Indian ponies.

FRANKLIN RECORDER BUSY

Chambersburg, Pa., Jan. 9.—During 1918, 20,065 papers were filed in the office of the Register and Recorder of Franklin county. This was an increase of 282 over 1917. Letters were also granted in 209 estates, an increase of twenty-eight over 1917.

CHARLES MATTER DEAD

Elizabethville, Jan. 9.—Charles Matter, who had been ill with pneumonia for the past few days, died at his late home in East Broad street. He was employed at the Swab wagon works for a number of years and was 32 years old. He is survived by a wife, at the present time seriously ill, and two daughters and a son. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon. Burial was in Maple Grove cemetery.
