WANT NAMES OF PERRY SOLDIERS

Draft Board Compiling War Record of County; Made Best Civil War Record

New Bloomfield, Pa., Jan. 10.—Efforts to complete records of Perry county men during the world war have been inaugurated by Perry county draft board. Perry county made the best record of any county in the Union during the Civil War and draft board officials believe that its record in this war will add to its luster of this old record.

Records are in the hands of the officials of all men who registered and went into the service through the draft board, but records of other enlistments are now being sought. Some persons enlisted before the registration, some enlisted before they reached the age of registration and some county persons, temporarily residing outside of the county, entered the service from other localities, and it is the names of such persons that strenuous efforts are now being made to get.

John C. Motter, clerk to the board is in charge of this work. He has requested that the names of such interested persons in the several communities to send complete lists of persons of that section in the service, if possible. Mr. Motter desires date of enlistment and place of enlistment.

BULLET IN HEAD Carlisle, Pa., Jan. 10.—With the bullet from a .32-caliber revolver lodged in his head, Harper Kelley, of Newcomertown, still lives and is apparently entirely recovered. Recently while William Snoke, Jr., of Philadelphia, was visiting at the Kelley home he accidentally discharged a revolver with which the two were playing; the bullet striking young Kelley just over his right eye and entering his skull. A physician advised against removing the ball and the wound is healing with no scar recovered and apparently no worse for the effects of his wound.

GENERAL STRIKE IS DECLARED IN ARGENTINE STATE

Disorders Lead to 200 Casualties Reported in Southern Republic Last Night

Buenos Aires, Jan. 10.—A general strike was declared throughout Argentine Republic at midnight. More than two hundred casualties had been reported last night as a result of the disorders incident to the strike. Disorders occurred throughout the city. The most serious fighting was at the Gasena, Iron Works, where troops and strikers clashed.

STRIKERS OBTAIN ARMS The strikers, it is asserted, then began shooting, and the government rushed three hundred infantrymen, with machine guns and two cannon to the scene. Meanwhile, the strikers are said to have sacked a privately owned gun shop and supplied themselves with arms and ammunition. The battle was still going on at 9 o'clock last night.

Marietta, Pa., Jan. 10.—John Kelley, 59 years old, died last night from a complication of diseases.

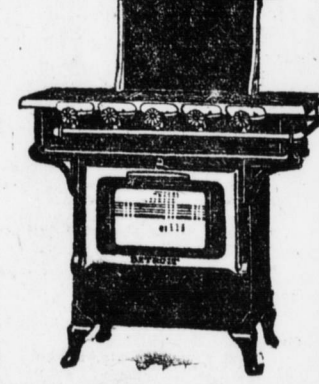
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
