COMMUTERS NOT TO LOSE UNDER TICKET RULINGS

Cost of Tickets For Fractions of February Will Be. Prorated

Commuters of the Central Pennsylvania territory, as well as those of all other districts, will be protected from financial loss through the change of the sale of commuters tickets from a thirty-day to a monthly basis under provisions contained in a supplementary announcement issued by the Federal Railroad Administration, officials at Washington said late yesterday.

At first it was thought that when me new method went into effect on Sebruary 1 some commuters whose tickets expire at times other than the first of the month would have suffered financial loss because they would have been obliged to purchase tickets which would have been good only until the end of February, rather than for the thirty flays for which they have ordinarily been good.

The Administration announcement says, among other things:

"In districts where commutation travel is heavy, conductors have very little opportunity to scrutinize tickets. When the tickets are limited to thirty days from date of sale, each individual ticket must be examined. If limited to the calendar month, the month for which they are issued stands out boldly and is easily discerned without close inspection.

"In order to deal fairly with commuters and make for as little friction as possible in the transition from the use of the old styles of fifty-four-time and interest and the communication of the commu as possible in the transition from the use of the old styles of fifty-four-trip and sixty-trip monthly commutation tickets to a calendar-month basis, the Railroad Administration has instructed all railroads that they may sell to commuters who have purchased tickets during the month of January expiring during the month of February other tickets for the remainder of the month of February for a sufficient number of rides to equal two trips per day at the same rate per ride as the original ticket." It was stated that the monthly fickets will be placed on sale four days before the beginning of the month for which they are issued, in order to enable the commuters to obtain them in advance. The new system, it was pointed out, while being entirely fair to the commuter who gives the conductor a ticket every day, will have a very great advantage to the railroads, not only in simplifying accounting, but in collecting tickets. plifying accounting, but in collect-
