"The Practice of presidents" will be the topic for study in the Christian Endeavor societies on Sunday evening.

Miss Ferné Stanford will have charge of the historical league of Christian Endeavor service at the Harris Street United Evangelical church tomorrow evening. Everybody is invited to attend and stay for the revival services at 7:30 o'clock.

Of sixty-two pupils in a high school in a small Illinois town, fifty-seven are charter members in a high school Christian Endeavor society, which meets weekly in the school building.

Plans are being laid for the coming months. A noted evangelist has been secured to come and assist Dr. Hawes in a series of meetings. The exact date of his coming has not been fixed, but will be known soon, and then announcements will be made. He comes with an assistant.

ASYLUM TRUSTEES TO FLOAT \$50,000 LOAN
The Pennsylvania State Lematc Asylum trustees have decided to float a loan of \$50,000 for which they will be personally responsible, as the Attorney General has decided that they may not negotiate a loan as trustees. All their available funds are gone and there will be no more until the Legislature appropriates them for the two-year period beginning next July. High war prices account for the depletion of their resources, the trustees say.

DUTCH REFORMED LAUNCHES DRIVE

"Progress Campaign" Is New Idea to Live Churchmen to Stimulate Interest

The Reformed Church in America (sometimes called the Dutch Reformed Church) has embarked on a large effort which it has named the "Progress Campaign." The executive secretary of this campaign is H. A. Kingsport, of New York City, well known as a Christian Endeavor leader, and under his experienced and vigorous management it is sure to succeed.

This campaign was unanimously adopted last June by the General Synod of the Reformed Church, and includes the following ten points:
1. To double within five years the membership of the church, extending it from 10,000 to 20,000. It is hoped to do this by an increasing momentum, adding 2,000 the first year, 30,000 the second year, and so on, until the fourth year, when it will total 100,000 and 45,000 the fifth. This takes count, it will be seen, of losses of death.

2. To secure at least one candidate for the ministry from each congregation—an endeavor that has not yet, it is believed, been put forward by a denomination. Reformed churches now have only sixty-three ministers in training for the ministry, and the times call for an even stronger leadership.
3. To provide efficient training for Bible school teachers. This calls for the organization of a teacher-training class in every school.
4. To organize young people's societies into training classes. In addition to regular services of the church, these societies should be held in connection with church activities.
5. To see that every member is a subscriber or regular reader of some religious magazine or paper.
6. To organize an effective missionary committee in every church.
7. To organize a women's mission society in every church and enlist every woman in its work.
8. To adopt systematic and proportionate giving on the part of all members. Emphasis is also to be laid upon the every-member basis.
9. Every church to contribute in ratio to all denominational boards.
10. To reform efficient committees for national and world service. The goal for the five years includes the establishment of at least twenty mission churches each year and American churches in Italy, or at least one mission in Italy, or in other lands, together with the development of the Reformed Church among the Mountaineers and in China. In the foreign field the campaign calls for increased work in Japan, with a new college for the evangelism in the North River district of China, with the development of medical work; work among the villages of India; women's medical work in Arabia, with labor in the Mesopotamia and in the interior of Arabia; the whole involving an expenditure of at least ten per cent. of the number of foreign missionaries over the highest number known previously.

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
