With the Mensheviks at Washington, Jan. 11. — Swedish press advices forwarded to the State Spepartment yesterday recounting the parrest of Lenine by Trotsky and the establishment of a dictatorship at Petrograd by Trotsky, attributed the split between the Boishevik leaders to Lenine's insistence on uniting with the Mensheviks. Lenine was reported confined at Kreml.

1918 Death Rate Largest In History of Tyrone Lorough

Tyrone, Pa., Jan. 11.—The death list for Tyrone in 1918 was the largest in the history of the town, due to the ravages of the influenza which swept over the country. One hundred and sixty-two deaths were recorded, fifty-four more than in any other year of the town's history. Eleven deaths resulted from influenza and thirty-eight from pneumonia.
