15,000 WORKED ON DRAFT IN PENNA.

40,000 Delinquents Reported; Major Murdock Fast Completing Reports

At least 15,000 persons were connected with the administration of the draft in Pennsylvania during the war according to a statement made to-day by Major William C. Murdock, chief draft officer for this state. This figure includes several thousand volunteer assistants who aided the boards at various times and who gave of their time and service.

The total number of persons regularly connected with the organization in charge of the draft is estimated by Major Murdock as 11,426, many of these served from the very organization of the selective system and some are still engaged in the closing up of the work. The strength of the organization at the time the armistice was signed is given as follows:
