67 Casualties Listed; 220 Are Wounded Severely; 52 Killed in Action

Washington, Jan. 16.—One hundred soldiers are mentioned in the lists today as dead from wounds. A total of 527 names are included on the regular lists. CHURCHILL PROPOSES TRAST TO PRESIDENT

London, Jan. 17.—At the American Society dinner last night in honor of John W. Davis, the American ambassador, Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary for war, delivered a speech of eulogy and proposed a toast to President Wilson. The other speakers were the chairman, Henry Stoner, Vice Admiral Sir Rosslyn Wemyss, first sea lord; Sir Gordon Stewart, attorney general; Walter Bruce Lockhart, first lord of the admiralty; and Lieutenant General John Stevens Cowans, of the British army council.

Leaders Agree on Chairmanships in Legislature

Philadelphia, Jan. 17.—Republican leaders who are meeting with

Speaker Robert S. Spangler and President pro tem Clarence J. Buckman, here to make up the membership of the House and Senate standing committees have agreed on additional chairmanships. Senator E. H. Vare, Philadelphia, will again head the Senate municipal affairs committee. Senator E.

E. Jones, Susquehanna, will be chairman of the agriculture committee, succeeding Senator H. W. Schantz, Lehigh. Senator Miles R. Nason, Erie, was selected as chairman of the committee on game and fisheries. He succeeds Senator W. C. McConnell, Northumberland. In the House, W. J. McCaig, Alle-

gheny, was definitely decided upon as chairman of the House appropriations committee. Senator A. F. Daix, Philadelphia, will head the Senate appropriations committee unless an eleventh hour change is made. Other House chairmen will be M. M. Hollingsworth, Chester county, agriculture, and S. J. Gans,

Philadelphia, health and sanitation. The law and order committees of the two houses have not been definitely agreed upon. The "wets" and "drys" have each presented a list for the House committee. It was said that Governor-elect Sprout will be consulted before the House law

and order committee is finally selected. The "drys" it is said, have put forth Representative Vickerman, Allegheny, as chairman of the committee. Legislative leaders predicted that Representative Williams Tioga, also a "dry," may be selected for the place.

STEAMER DISABLED
Halifax, N. S., Jan. 17.—The American steamer Susquehanna, which sailed from New York January 10 for Genoa, put in here last night with her steering gear disabled. The damage is not serious and the steamer will resume her voyage as soon as repairs are made.
