

MORE CORN THAN EVER THIS YEAR

Look Is For Greatest Acreage in History of State For 1919

Predictions of the greatest acreage ever put in to corn are being made for this year by men at the State Department of Agriculture who have been receiving reports from various counties as to the unusual opportunities afforded farmers to do plowing. Thanks to the weather and the use of tractors in larger numbers than ever before available there was more land plowed last fall than usual. Some of the reports indicate that the land prepared for planting with corn in the spring is more than in years as far as farmers are concerned and that the rest in gardening appears to be keen in the smaller towns. If the price of corn remains up the acreage will go considerably beyond the figure of 1,664,000 acres of 1918 in the yield, in the face of discouraging weather and other conditions, was 63,500,000 bushels in numbers.

State figures indicate that the acreage in winter wheat for 1919 is 588,000 against 1,420,000 a year ago. There will also be an increase in acreage in buckwheat in the state that price conditions are good opinion of men here.

Some experiments with spring wheat were made in Lackawanna and other counties last year and results indicate intention to try this thing in other sections during the year.

Intestinal troubles carried off 129 children under two years and over that age, while typhoid fever killed 129 persons of all ages, diphtheria 107, diphtheria and scarlet fever 107, tuberculosis 724, tuberculosis in other organs 128, cancer 526 and kidney stones 251. There were sixty-eight suicides during the month. Twenty-seven persons died from falls in mines, 119 were killed in road accidents and 526 by other causes of violence.

Control Social Diseases—Closer cooperation between the authorities of the law and the State Department of Health, for the purpose of controlling the spread of social diseases among criminal classes, is urged by Dr. B. Franklin Royer, State Commissioner of Health. Dr. Royer to-day sent letters to physicians, judges and magistrates in many sections of the state asking for their co-operation in the Health Department's campaign against these maladies and drawing their attention to the fact that the department now has thirty dispensaries in operation throughout the state.

Women Are Praised in Annual Report of the R.R. Administration

Washington, Jan. 17.—High praise is accorded to the women railroad employees in the annual report of the Federal administration's division of labor, directed by W. S. Carter, made to-day. Between January 1 and October 31 last year, the number of women workers on American railroads increased from 60,000 to 101,000, constituting about five per cent of the two million rail employees, and fully all of these are due to the fact that in permanently, officials report that whenever women have been given positions, they have proved value in practically all the clerical and semi-clerical occupations. Prejudices are rapidly disappearing and they are being recognized as permanent additions to the labor force.
