Hugo Haase. Herr Leukart and Luise Zietz; the Democrats two seats, Herr Naumann and Herr Hartmann, and the Na-tionalists, the Centrist and the Peo-ple's party one seat each. Friedrich Ebert is presumed to stand the best chance of obtaining, the chancellorship.
