the time of the incident for which he was cited and was promoted for gallantry. The citation said that after another officer had been killed, he assumed full command of a detail repairing an ammunition railway near Thiacourt on Septem-

railway near Thiacourt on September 27.

"I went out to assist Lieutenant Plympton, an engineer officer, of Buffalo, with a volunteer detail of men," Captain Hall said. "We were at Dead Man's Corner, near Thiacourt, and the shells were falling fast. One struck twenty yards away and Plympton and a corporal were instantly killed. As I could do nothing for them, I went ahead with the men and completed the work."
