Return in Scattered Form

Plans for divisional parades in home cities have been upset by the irregular flow of troops homeward. General March said the units were returning in such scattered form that it is a great majority of cases it would seem improbable that divisional organization could be held together long enough for large parades.

Big Military Camp at Brest

The greatest military camp in the world will be established at Brest when plans for extension of embarkation facilities have been completed. General March said Brest would be the backbone of the American demobilization system. It already has handled 51 per cent of the soldiers sent back to the United States up to date. Its capacity for 50,000 men is to be doubled.

Belgium Needs Money Now as Reparation

Paris, Feb. 8.—President Wilson has been forced to abandon his proposed visit to Belgium. It is understood that in the event he returns to Europe he will accept the Belgian invitation. The pressure of the President's duties in Paris will be so great in the few days remaining before his departure for the United States that he has been compelled reluctantly to forego his trip to Brussels and other parts of Belgium.

Lower Tax by Half a Mill

It was thought that a rate of four mills would provide sufficient revenue for the year, but when the Commissioners reviewed the extensive road and bridge program which they had planned, it was decided to only lower the rate one-half a mill. This provides about \$42,000 more than with a four-mill rate.
