PENROSE SORES HEARS SPEECHES WASTE OF MONEY FLAYS CONGRESS

Funds Poured Out in Kind of Debauch by Reckless Makers of Laws

Washington, Feb. 13.—In his speech on the war revenue bill yesterday afternoon, Senator Penrose, of Pennsylvania, asserted that pending bills in both houses reached the staggering aggregate of \$10,000,000,000.

The "blunders" of the Administration in handling the railroads, in putting the main lines out of business, and in smothering other enterprises, he said, had entailed a loss equal to the cost of the war.

He referred to the fund of \$1,800,000,000 spent by the Shipping Board, which money he said was largely waste.

"I want to express my regret and concern that this bill has been the vehicle for irrelevant legislation," he continued.

Instead of the bill carrying \$8,000,000,000 the Finance Committee of the Senate was able to reduce it to \$5,000,000,000.
