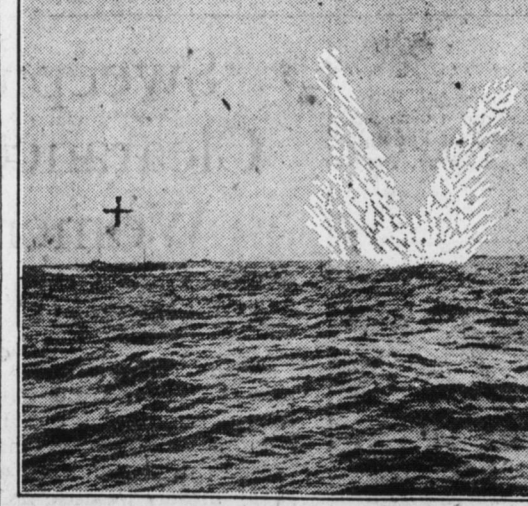
Favor Improvement of Harrisburg-Reading Pike at Early Date

GERMANY MUST GIVE REPORT ON WAR MATERIAL

Subcommittee Presents Report to Supreme War Council

Paris, Feb. 13.—The Supreme War Council has reached a final determination of the new terms of the German armistice. There were present at the meeting yesterday in addition to President Wilson and the foreign ministers of the great powers, Marshal Foch, Field Marshal Haig, Marshal Petain, General Pershing and General Diaz. A full agreement on the terms was presented in the report from the subcommittee, embracing military and economic measures. The report was unanimous, including the adherence of the American members, General Tasker H. Bliss and Norman Davis, which indicates that economic measures figure in the new terms equally with military measures.
