SALARY RAISERS ARE NOW DOOMED

Little Hope For Any Advances on Capitol Hill According to Talk



Precious few increases on salary will be made in the state government this session. Legislators' Orphan schools, a general increase of salary for attaches of the Commonwealth, the "more pay" movement that has been in vogue on Capitol Hill, are doomed, according to what has been going on in the corridors and legislative halls. The increases that will be made will be in certain departments for which the "reorganization" legislation has been drawn, such as the governor's office and the departments of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, banking commission and others which are laboring under old laws. The secretary of agriculture and some other officials may have salaries "equalized," but beyond that there will be little doing.

The bills for the general increase on the Hill may never be presented.

Department Bills Out

Two of the administration bills reorganizing departments were reported to the house last night by the appropriation committee and passed for the first time. One relates to the governor's office and the other to the department of the secretary of the Commonwealth. The appropriations committee reported out the Class bill for a commission to erect a statue to Theodore Roosevelt and the Soldiers' Orphan schools, a special state hospital deficiency bill.

Legislative visitors: Ex-Senators T. M. Kurtz, Weingartner and Adams were senatorial visitors. Ex-Representatives Isaac Stern and M. J. Spaiser of Philadelphia, were also at the Capitol.

Col. Moody here.—Col. Samuel Moody, well known in state affairs for many years, was at the Capitol. Trustees Named—Senatorial trustees of the Soldiers' Orphan schools were named last night as follows: H. L. Haldeman, Marshall Phipps and Frank Markle.

Board to Meet.—The state Board of Pardons will hold its first session under the new administration tomorrow morning.

Fisher the Job.—Banking Commissioner Fisher has been busy at Pittsburgh the last few days looking after the affairs of the Park Bank. He will return here tomorrow.

Flowers for Clement.—Senator W. J. McNichol sent a basket of handsome flowers to Commissioner Samuel M. Clement, Jr., when he assumed his duties.

Judge Will Charge Jury Today in the Scott Nearing Case

New York, Feb. 18.—Both sides summed up yesterday in the case of Scott Nearing, former college professor, on trial in Federal court for alleged seditious writings during the war, and Judge Mayer will charge the jury to-day. After Nearing had made the argument on his own behalf, Earl Barnes, Assistant Federal District Attorney, reviewed the case for the Government. He declared that in expressing his opinions concerning the war Nearing had done so for the purpose of obstructing the orderly process of law, merely because he did not agree with the law.

Page Intended to Return to States After the War

Rome, Feb. 18.—With reference to rumors that are in circulation here that Thomas Nelson Page, the American Ambassador to Italy, is to resign, the Associated Press learns on good authority that Mr. Page has said he always expected to return to the United States when his term ended. It was added that Mr. Page felt that he had done all he could do to serve the interests of the United States in Italy and further the efforts of President Wilson to make more firm the ties between the two countries.

THIEVES AT MARYSVILLE

Marysville, Pa., Feb. 18.—After territories on both sides of Marysville had suffered from depredations of thieves for several weeks, Marysville had her first visit last evening. The only booty secured as far as is known, was some foodstuffs, taken from the back porch of B. D. Bare, Front street. Two men, one white and one colored, were discovered at the Bare home about 7 o'clock in the evening. They made a getaway, but later returned and again escaped. A posse was hastily formed and men, armed with shot guns and revolvers, made a thorough search of the borough, but without success.

ASSISTED AT FUNERAL

New Cumberland, Pa., Feb. 18.—The Rev. A. R. Ayres, pastor of Trinity United Brethren church, was called to Moundsville yesterday to assist at the funeral of Harry Gintzer. The Rev.
