Army Gas Masks of No Value to Miners

Washington, Feb. 27.—Army gas masks are of no value in protecting coal miners against mine gases, and only of slight value in protecting workers from amonia fumes, Lieutenant Colonel B. C. Goss, head of the sales and salvage section of the army chemical warfare division, declared in issuing a general warning against their use for these purposes. Colonel Goss said serious losses of life were feared unless the warnings reached purchasers of the masks who were being misled as to their capabilities by dealers who have purchased large numbers of them from the government since the war ended.
