

Hitchcock Sees Peace in League of Nations

Washington, Feb. 23.—Peace with the League of Nations or war and preparations for war without it, the internationalism of justice and the internationalism of the socialist, the anarchist and the Bolshevik are the alternatives before the world, declared Senator Hitchcock, chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee, in an address late yesterday to the Senate.

The proposed league, Senator Hitchcock asserted, would "render aid to members as nearly impossible as human agencies can devise." He spoke of the growth of socialism and the popular demand for relief from war and its sacrifices, and said peoples throughout the world, if denied measures for peace, would violently protest and seize over.
