American Food For Poland Reaches Danzig

Paris, Feb. 28.—Herbert Hoover, director general of the Inter-Allied relief organization, issued the following statement:

"The American steamer Westward Ho reached Danzig yesterday, carrying six thousand tons of food for Poland, the gift of combined American committees of Jews and Poles. The food will be rushed to Warsaw by rail for distribution by local committees under direction of representatives of the United States relief administration on the plan so successfully operated in Belgium and northern France.

"A total of 17,000 tons of food has reached Danzig for Poland during the past three weeks.

"The relief administration reports indicate that there is a shocking need for clothing of every sort. Neither stocks of clothing nor shoes exist in Poland, nor is there raw material from which to make them."
