BILL PRESENTED
 Largest General Appropriation Bill For State Government Ever Drafted

All records for appropriation bills in Pennsylvania were broken last night when Chairman William J. McCaig, of the House Appropriations Committee, introduced into the lower branch the general appropriation bill. It carries the largest sum ever provided and is in the most complete form of any such bill known. However, there are indications that the pruning knife will be used on the measure which was promptly referred to the committee for revision. It carries the gigantic sum of \$42,077,388.13. The last general appropriation bill, that of 1917, was approved for about \$35,000,000.

Old Cars Go.—Highway Commissioner Sadler has replaced three copies and now without automobiles used by the heads of the Highway Department with three machines of moderate cost. The difference between the cost of the machines and the old cars had been purchased, and the cost of the machines bought by the department this week approximates \$9,000. There is a saving in operating cost of \$300 per year for each car, or \$900 for the three.

People Warned.—Citizens of Bucks and Montgomery counties have been warned by the Department of Agriculture against buying at high prices seed potatoes from agents who are working through telegrams from purchasers. It is reported agents are at work selling at high prices seed potatoes claimed to be practically immune to "bugs" and "blights" and extreme yields. One agent is said to represent a New York State seed firm that refuses to guarantee agents' claims, although offered two opportunities through telegrams from Economic Zoologist Sanders.
