

### WILSON, FEELING STRONGER, GETS DOWN TO WORK

Plans to Speed Up the Work of the Peace Conference

On Board the U. S. S. George Washington, March 11.—President Wilson, feeling more vigorous than at any time since his departure from the United States, devoted some time today to his approaching tasks in Paris. The progress made by the Peace Conference during his absence encourages the hope that he may be able to make his stay abroad shorter than he at first expected. The President is planning to do everything possible to expedite the work of the conference.

London, Mar. 12.—The German government troops, greatly reinforced, have resumed the fighting in Lichtenberg, says a German wireless dispatch received here. The dispatch adds that the Spartacans already have been obliged to evacuate the police headquarters and the post office. Witnesses of the fighting in Berlin with great fury, according to untold reports received in Copenhagen from the German capital and forwarded by the Exchange Telegraph Company.

### Says British Blundered Trying to Keep Ireland Out of World War

New Haven, Conn., March 12.—Declaring that the British government adopted a blundering policy early in the war in trying to keep Ireland out of the conflict, Sir Horace Plunkett, of Dublin, in an address at the Graduate Club here last night, said that when England needed manpower, it used the "worst methods of enlistment" in getting men from Ireland.

### United States to Get 83 Hun Ships in Chilean Ports

Buenos Aires, March 12.—According to a dispatch to the Nation from Santiago the United States will have turned over to it eighty-three German ships interned in Chilean ports, by virtue of the decision reached by the Supreme War Council in Paris.

The defendants are all from Steelton and both alleged murders were committed in that borough.

### PUT FUTURE OF GERMAN ARMY UP TO MILITARY MEN

American Members of the Supreme Council Had Little to Say

Paris, March 12.—The American members of the Supreme Council, it is understood, permitted the military experts to exercise their judgment regarding the proper size and character of the future German army. In order to have a basis of discussion, the Americans, it is reported, suggested an army of 400,000 men, but only because that was the number mentioned in the first armistice proposal.

### Curb on Sweet Tooth of Americans in 1918 Did Not Reduce Consumption

Jersey City, N. J., Mar. 12.—Putting the United States on a sugar ration did not reduce the consumption in 1918, according to the annual report of the American Sugar Refining Company, issued here today. The company did a \$200,000,000 business, making a profit of \$6,661,683, which was \$3,393,607 less than that of 1917, the report stated.

### Government Will Abandon Greatest Ordnance Plant

Washington, March 12.—Abandonment of the Neville Island ordnance plant, planned as the largest munitions factory in the world, was announced yesterday by the War Department. Not only will construction be stopped at once, but the buildings already completed will be dismantled and the tools and machinery manufactured or nearing completion will be transferred to other government arsenals or sold.

### Chinese Opponents of Rail Unification Relax in Policy

Peking, March 12.—The influential Chinese interests which have been opposed to the plan for the unification and internationalization of the Chinese railways are relaxing somewhat in their opposition to the plan. The Japanese official opposition continues, however.

### AMERICANS WANT FREEDOM OF CABLES

Such a course, it is explained, will furnish for the children a basis for the study of good literature in the future, and will do much to discourage among the children the reading of trashy literature. Members of the Story Tellers' League are to form an essential agency in carrying the plan into execution.

Eleven meetings are being held weekly by the Story Tellers' League for relating juvenile legends in churches of this city and Camp Hill. City churches co-operating in the plan are St. Paul's Episcopal, Zion Lutheran, Market Street Baptist and Reformed, Olivet Presbyterian, Grace Methodist, Christ Lutheran, Paxton Presbyterian and the Chevy Shotom Synagogue. One meeting is held at Camp Hill by the combined churches of that place.
