
Sharing War Debt By Associated Press Paris, March 12. — France has abandoned for the present at least abuthoritatively asserted by one ofi-terance that what had been an em-barrassing possibility has now been definitely eliminated from the de-liberations, although it is possible that France might at some future time attempt to secure assistance.
