# MAYOR IS ASKED TO AID SOLDIER **BACK FROM WAR**

The War Department Wants Academy Students to Com-Fighters Properly Restored to Civil Life

ceived a letter from Arthur Woods, man debate will be held at the Harrspecial assistant to the secretary of war, asking the executive's co-operation in efforts to "safeguard the economic welfare of soldiers who have been discharged from the service and are returning to your state and city to re-establish themselves in civil life." Copies of this letter have been mailed by Mr. Woods to mayors of all principal cities.

The letter continues.

The letter continues:

"The opportunity that the War Department has to actively serve the enlisted man," Mr. Woods writes, "expires, it might be thought, with their separation from the service fully paid, and with a sixty dollar bonus and transportation to their homes. They go from the service in good health, or, if physically disabled, compensated by the system of war risk insurance. While the actual responsibility of the war department does end here, the moral responsibility does not end until the soldier has been absorbed by normal civil life.

"Feeling this moral obligation as we do, the purpose of the war department, is to co-ordinate, through my office, the various activities of

"Feeling this moral obligation as we do, the purpose of the war department, is to co-ordinate, through my office, the various activities of the Federal, state and city government as well as those of private organizations, looking to a system which will minimize the injustice and the peril of unemployment of discharged soldiers. The war department wants to do all it can to supplement and to help local effort."

Mr. Woods in his letter expresses the opinion that the vast majority of discharged soldiers return to their pre-war occupations naturally.

"As a business man I believe that the services of a discharged soldier are an excellent 'buy' for an employer."
