Berlin, March 15.—Under Secretary of State Von Braun, before leaving Berlin with the German commission to participate in the conference at Brussels regarding the turning over by Germany of her mercantie fleet and securities in exchange for food, received the correspondent and informed him that Germany was prepared to begin immediately the surrender of her entire fleet and conclude an agreement covering the other conditions in return for a definite agreement specifying the amount of food deliverable until the next harvest, the price and conditions of payment for it.

Rome, March 15.—According to an interview with Stefania Turr, a daughter of a noted Hungarian general, printed to-day in the Giornale Ditalia, the belief still exists that Emperor Nicholas and his wife, as well as some of the Russian grand dukes, were not put to death by the
