

CONFESS PLOT TO ATTACK THE U. S. TROOPS

Agitators Planned to Organize Spartan Forces in Germany
Coblenz, March 25.—Three agitators, admittedly Spartan sympathizers, confessed to the American military authorities that they came into the occupied area for the purpose of furthering a movement among the German workmen to organize Spartan forces sufficiently strong enough to attack the American soldiers and take possession of Coblenz banks and railway stations and receive assistance from unoccupied Germany.

Original Plans Failed
The original plans were for an uprising on March 15 or the day after, according to the plans of the agitators, but fell through owing to lack of interest among the workmen.

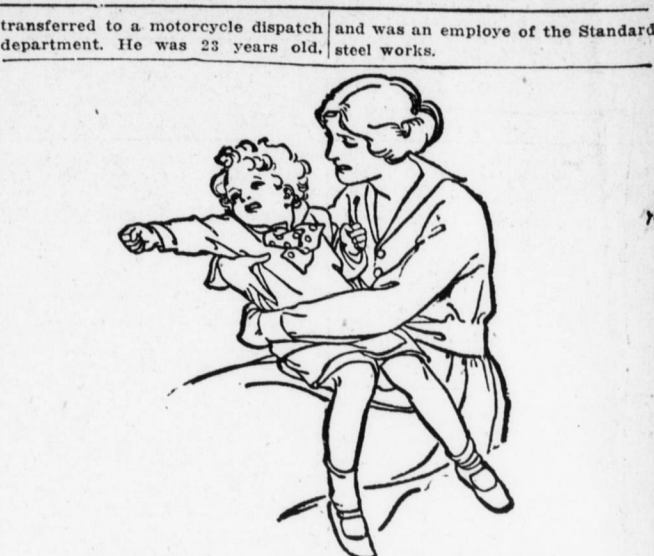
GROUND BROKEN FOR HOSPITAL
Gettysburg, Pa., Mar. 25.—Ground was broken to-day for the hospital to be erected here, the gift to the community of Mr. and Mrs. John M. 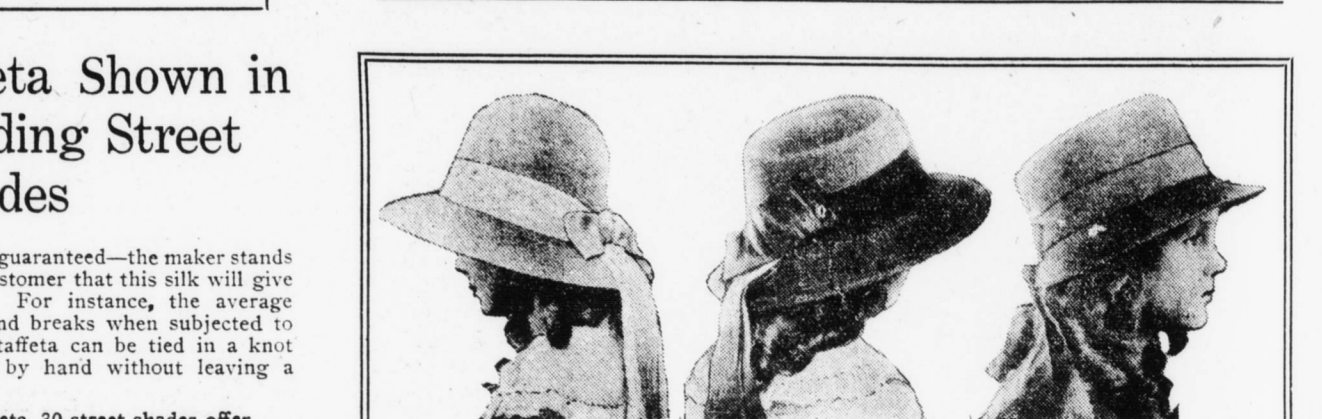
