Governor William C. Sproul's bill to create the department conservation to concentrate the game, fisheries, water supply and forestry departments under one head, appeared in the Senate late yesterday. It was presented by Senator Richard J. Baldwin, of Delawaren and is as already outlined. The measure creates the bureaus of game, fish forestry and water, and abolishes the game, fish and forestry departments and the water supply commission.

The conservation department would be under the charge of a commissioner at a salary of \$\$,000 a year. An advisory of nine to be appointed by the Governor is also created, the members of which are to advise the commissioner from time to time on such atters as he may bring before them, and are to serve without compensation.

Each of the four bureaus would be in charge of a director at a salary of \$5,000 a year. The bill also provides for the appointment of game protectors, deputy game protectors, forestry, fire wardens and forestry detectives.

Bill Reorganizing Department Would Locate the New Organization Here

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PLAN REVIVAL OF RORKE BILL

Advocates of Sunday Entertainments Scheme to Get Bill on Calendar


