## Plan to Build Up

By Associated Press.

Washington, March 27 .- Plans to build up a large medical reserve corps including all members of the profession who have served creditably during the war, were disclosed by the War Department. Commissions in the reserve are being offered officers of the medical department who are being discharged from the service upon the completion of their duties connected with the emer-

Under the law these officers cannot be retired to the inactive list of the reserve but must be discharged and reappointed in order to con-tinue their connection with the medical department. Officers discharged are being requested to apply for appointment in the reserve corps.

#### Places War Cost at 52,000,000,000 Pounds

London, March 27 .- Edgar Cramwriter, estmates the direct cost of the war to the allies at 28,360,000,-000 pounds sterling, and to the Corthe war to the allies at 28,360,000,000 pounds sterling, and to the Central European powers at 13,675,000,000 younds. He estimates the total cost of the war, including indirect losses, at 52,000,000,000 pounds. There has been nothing, he says, approaching this destruction of capital wealth in the history of the world. The immediate result of the unheaval is to be found in the high cost of living and universal increase of wages. Judging from past experience he concludes that the fall in the price of commodities and wages will take place slowly and gradually.




