INDIANS IN FORMOSA PROVINCE SACKFORT AND KILL GARRISON

Red Foes Escape, Taking Horses, Munitions and Supplies; Seventeen Victims of Attack in General Uprising; National Troops Hurry to the Rescue

Buenos Aires, Mar. 29.-A general Indian uprising in Formosa province is reported, and it is said that one tribe has sacked the fort at Yunka, killing the garrison of two non-commissioned of-ficers and fifteen soldiers. The Indians escaped, taking horses, munitions and supplies from the 15rt, according to report. National troops are being hurried to the province where many

settlements are said to have been attacked by the outlaws.

The province of Formosa is in the northeastern part of Argentina and is bounded on three sides by the Paraguay, Pilcomayo and Bermej rivers. Little is known of it except that it is a great forest-covered plain. It is sparsely settled, having a population of 5,589 in 1900.




