

EXICOS GRANT TO JAPAN IS TO BE INVESTIGATED

American Embassy at Mexico City Is Instructed to Make Probe

Washington, March 31.—The American embassy at Mexico City is instructed to-day to make inquiries concerning the report that the Mexican government has granted agricultural concessions to Japanese in Lower California and to report the facts as quickly as possible. No official statement has reached the department about the concessions and surprise was occasioned by the dispatch from Mexico yesterday.

Great Acres Involved

The land, upwards of a million acres, below the California border, was granted by the President Diaz to the California and Mexican Land Company of Los Angeles, of which General Harrison Gray Otis of Los Angeles was the leading figure. It was desert land with nothing growing on it but sage brush, cactus and chaparral.

W. Dill, Pioneer Auto Dealer, Dies of Burns He Received in Garage Fire

W. Dill, 54 years old, well-known automobile man, died on Saturday night from the effect of the burns suffered in the City Transfer company fire last Monday. His death occurred at the Harrisburg hospital at which institution he had been since his injuries.

Americans Raid Bolshevik Line

Indemnity Is Reported From 30 to 50 Billions

Paris, March 31.—The Intransigent prints the report that the indemnity which Germany must pay for the damages of the war has been fixed at a figure between 150,000,000,000 and 250,000,000,000 francs (\$30,000,000,000 and \$50,000,000,000).

NORSE SHIP ON WAY TO PORT

Longworth Renews His Attack on Mann

Washington, March 31.—Representative Longworth of Ohio, Republican, renewed his attack upon Representative Mann, of Illinois, in a statement yesterday declaring that the former Republican floor leader, although defeated for the speakership by a two to one vote, was in a position to wield greater power in the next Congress than had been elected.
