Two Thousand More Men Lose Mexican Minister and Japan-Jobs in Week in Sixty

Washington, April 2 .- A slight increase in unemployment throughout country is shown by reports for the country is shown by reports for the past week received by the Federal Employment Service from sixty cities. A surplus of labor was reported by thirty-six cities, a shortage of labor by seven, and an equality of supply and demand by seven-teen. The number of unemployed in the cities reporting increased by 2,000 during the week.

New Hampshire and Vermont showed an equality of supply and demand; Massachusetts, a surplus, principally in textile industries; Maine, an increasing surplus, and connecticut a surplus in most cities. All New York state excepting the territory about Yonkers, reported a surplus.
