



Westmoreland Joins **Good Roads Parade**

Westmoreland county has joined he movement for improved roads. County Commissioners W. D. Rea-mer and George W. Deeds informed Commissioner Lewis S. Sadler, that an extensive building pro-gram for secondary roads would be undertaken at county expense and with State co-operation. Funds to the credit of the county will be used. The construction will include from Greensburg to Youngwood; 1.48 miles in North Huntingdon; Derry oward New Kensington to Derronda. Bids were opened at the department for furnishing 5,071,065 gal-lons of bituminous materials for nacadam or bituminous indernals for macadam or bituminous surfaced highways. This is the great-est amount of material of the kind ever to be offered and bids were made on five districts. The size of the offering indicates a tremendous amount of road work to be undertaken. The bidders included the Barrett Company, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh; Hoadley Good Roads Company, Atlantic Refining Company, United Gas Improvement Company, Philadelphia; Maloney Oil and Manufacturing Company, Wilkes-Barre.
