120,000 ARE OUT Workers in Hamborn, Rhinish Prussia, Expected to Join Strike

Copenhagen, April 4.—[Despatches received here say that the strike in the Ruhr district of Germany has unexpectedly spread extensively. It now includes the Krupp works and that 120,000 persons are involved.

Berlin, Wednesday, April 3.—The strikes both at Struttgard and in the Ruhr district seem to have been checked by the energetic action of the government by the prompt use of troops, martial law and other salutary measures.

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FOUR BILLION DOLLAR CONGRESSES ARE COMING

Washington, April 4.—The passing of the "billion-dollar" Congress of pre-war days and the coming of the peace period of "four-billion-dollar" Congresses was predicted last night in a statement by Representative Good, of Iowa, who will be chairman of the appropriation committee in the next House.

Reviewing the financial problems to be faced by the next Congress, Mr. Good estimated that the appropriations "necessary for the various government expenditures in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, would total more than \$3,800,000,000.
